A Window to the World: Images by Youth on Issues that Matter.

Created by TakingITGlobal, this deck of cards features images from our online Global Gallery that have been curated and produced with support from the Renaissance Expedition (REx), through the Kanja-Simpson Chimp Fund.

REx aims to identify, connect, mentor and promote leaders who have a passion both for driving high performance in their organizations and for helping to make the world a better place.

The Kanja-Simpson Chimp Fund supports young entrepreneurs who have an interest in global concerns.

It was established to honour the late Jimmy Kanja, a Kenyan entrepreneur who inspired many young leaders.

REx is eager to support Taking It Global's efforts to empower youth to act on the world's greatest challenges. Each artwork was created by a participant in our
Adobe Youth Voices program through educational
workshops and represents a range of issues and
challenges including; Culture, Education, Environment,
Health, Human Rights and Peace & Conflict.

We recognize that these topics aren't always the easiest to weave into primary or secondary-level lesson plans, and so the card deck also includes 15 creative learning activities that can be used as a tool in sparking deep conversation and reflection in the classroom.

All of the beautiful and moving images found in the collection have been created by youth across the globe, who have found their voice in art. The images represent an issue that the individual youths see in their community and beyond

The image cards can be used to introduce, re-introduce or conclude a topic across all subjects and curriculums. They can be divided up by issue or age group, and can serve as a tool for individual, small group and whole class activities that promote creativity, global citizenship and student voice.

The images can be used across several subject areas including Language, The Arts, Physical Education, Science and Social Studies, History and Geography to encourage deep thinking global issues.

Select an image.

Think of a pose that you will hold for 60 seconds to represent the issue and emotions identified on the card.

This activity can be done individually or as a group.



To the Beat

With your group, create a short musical performance with sounds and rhythm from everyday objects along with snapping, clapping, stomping etc. that represents the image you have selected.



Poetry Slam

Write a short poem to express your interpretation of what is happening in the image you selected and perform it with passion in your tone of voice.



Three Facts

Examine your selected image and ask yourself, "why is this issue important?"

Research 3 facts about the issue and generate a short quiz with multiple-choice questions.

Test the knowledge of your friends.



In Charge

You have been appointed as a distinguished leader (select one: Mayor, Principal, Prime Minister, President, CEO).

In your role, prepare three strategies that you will undertake as a decision-maker in order to address the issue identified on your selected image.

As part of this role-play, deliver your strategies in the form of a speech.



Web of Connections

Each person in your group selects an image and shows the image to others in the group.

Take turns describing how the issues are connected to one another.

A ball of yarn or string might be used and thrown from one person to the next as people describe the interconnection between each card.



Do I Care?

Imagine a dark future scenario of what would happen in the world if people chose not to care or act upon the issue identified in your selected image.

Describe this to members of your group.



<u>Advice</u> Column

Imagine that you are the artist, writing to an expert to ask for help on the issue identified in the selected image.

What is the question and how does the expert respond?



Issue Thermometer

Design a short survey to understand whether or not people in your community feel that this issue is important.






